

Sir John Zochonis 1929 – 2013

"He's left an incredible legacy...."





In 1977 Sir John Zochonis founded The Zochonis Charitable Trust.

Its aim was, and still is today, to tackle the inequalities in education, health and social provision primarily in Manchester and the North West. The Trust also supports the Arts and Overseas Charities.

The Trust and Sir John are synonymous. As a philanthropist he was inspirational. He saw philanthropy almost as a responsibility; there were a number of occasions where he could have said about a request that surely it was a statutory responsibility, something the government should be paying for, nothing to do with him. But more often his response was, "If no one else will do it I will have to".

He had an unusually "hands off" approach. If he trusted someone and the organisation that was enough. He had enormous respect and admiration for volunteers.

It is impossible to know how many charities, which are thriving today in Greater Manchester, would have disappeared long ago but for the help of The Zochonis Charitable Trust.

It is difficult to quantify, but not difficult to imagine, how many thousands of lives will be changed for the better in the future because of Sir John's perception, awareness and understanding; his forward thinking, his respect and hope for young people and his commitment to make things happen.

A few years before he retired Sir John was made a chieftain in Nigeria and it is not surprising that the name he was given when translated into English means, "He whose hand spreads good to all".

Thanks to the hard work and commitment of his nephews and other Trustees, and Sir John's generosity, the Trust continues to make an enormous contribution to the lives of so many people in Greater Manchester and the North West, it is a living legacy of a generous and modest man who inspired so many of us to do something for the benefit of others, and not wait for something to happen.

These are 40 years worth celebrating.

The Zochonis Charitable Trust (ZCT) was founded by Sir John Zochonis in 1977 to assist charities operating in the North West of England. It was funded by Sir John donating a considerable number of his own PZ Cussons shares to the Trust.

In its first year, the Trust made just a single donation of £6,750 which was to The University of Manchester. Since then, as more shares were bequeathed by members of the Zochonis family and as PZ Cussons dividends have increased, that figure has risen substantially. Currently around thirteen percent of the company's dividends go to the Trust.

The focus remains to support charities working in the North West of England, although a portion goes to help charities operating in West Africa. In the main, the Trust assists young people, particularly in the spheres of education, health and social provision.

ZCT donates to a wide variety of charitable causes which range from national charities with operations in the North West of England to much smaller, regional organisations which work to meet local needs and problems. The sizes of donations range from substantial sums to lesser amounts which are nonetheless very welcome.

Over the past forty years a number of people have given their time selflessly to assist with the Trust and a debt of gratitude is owed to them. Currently, ZCT is run by three Trustees and a Management Assistant, Marie Gallagher. Between them, the four ZCT team members have nearly half a century's experience working with the Trust. Annual operating costs are low, at less than two percent of the amount given to charity.


2017 sees the fortieth anniversary of Sir John's legacy. It is also the year when, cumulatively, ZCT will have donated over £55 million to charities.

The Zochonis Charitable Trust - Education

One of the main reasons why Sir John set up The Zochonis Charitable Trust was to provide opportunities in education for those whose circumstances could prevent them from reaching their full potential. Thus each year the Trust donates nearly one third of its income to schools, universities and learning institutions which provide a wide range of wonderful educational opportunities for children of all ages.

The Trust also supports a number of charities which help children and young people who struggle with reading and writing, and others which offer personalised mentoring support to vulnerable children or those at risk of exclusion.

ZCT funds secondary school bursaries making some of the best education in the Greater Manchester area accessible to bright children from low income families. The Trust additionally supports capital projects at these schools, helping to enhance a range of facilities for current and future pupils as well as benefiting local communities who also use them.

The Trust has consistently supported The University of Manchester, and now contributes towards its Access Programme which identifies, mentors and supports young people who will be the first in their family to attend university. Without such support, this first-class education might be unattainable.

Aside from sponsoring academic institutions, ZCT also helps support a wide range of artistic, historical and scientific endeavours through Outreach programmes enabling institutions such as the Royal Northern College of Music, The Hallé, The Lowry Theatre, Manchester Museum, the Imperial War Museum, the Manchester Art Gallery and the Museum of Science and Industry to provide forward thinking and innovative learning experiences for young people. These Outreach programmes can often mean that projects are brought to schools and can inspire those who might not otherwise have access to them. These culturally enriching programmes foster creativity, insight and self-confidence among young people.

WITHINGTON GIRLS' SCHOOL

The Bursary Fund provides meanstested financial assistance to enable bright girls from financially disadvantaged families to attend Withington Girls' School and benefit from the advantages of a fantastic all-round education, giving them confidence and the ability to achieve their potential.

The Trust's very generous support has made a vital difference in enabling the scheme to grow and thrive to the extent where one in six girls are now in receipt of a bursary.

The Zochonis Charitable Trust has made a lasting difference to the life opportunities of hundreds of talented young people from disadvantaged families in Greater Manchester, with funding for the University of Manchester's undergraduate Manchester Access Programme scholarships, student travel awards and initiatives to enhance employability after graduation.

The University's Manchester Museum has received generous support for its educational Outreach activities, with funding for an inflatable classroom-size replica of the Museum for visits to schools in more deprived areas which struggle with transport costs for a school trip to the Museum [see opposite page]. Over 1400 primary school children have already enjoyed inschool workshops featuring real artefacts from the Museum, with high levels of engagement.

Most recently, the Trustees have funded a PhD studentship in the University's Global Development Institute, whose world-leading research seeks practical solutions to poverty and global inequality. The PhD studentship has been awarded to an outstanding Ghanaian researcher whose project will help shape future policy in Ghana to tackle poverty in remote rural areas.


IMPERIAL WAR MUSEUM NORTH





Facsimile of West Africa map c.1884


ZCT supports a small number of UK registered charities in Sierra Leone and Ghana. The focus of its charitable funding is primarily in the areas of health and education where there is great need.

Sierra Leone is one of the poorest countries in the world and its economic woes were compounded by a lengthy civil war. More recently the country suffered terribly during the Ebola outbreak. Whilst Sierra Leone is now officially free of Ebola, that disease placed an immense strain on the country's already inadequate medical resources.

Whilst Ghana is more prosperous it lacks the means to deal fully with the situation in the North of the country where climate change is causing the Sahara Desert to encroach southwards. The North has always been the poorest part of the country and now that the situation there has worsened, the need for better education and healthcare has never been greater.

In terms of operating, the ZCT Trustees visit Sierra Leone and Ghana annually as part of their due diligence programme. The visits to Sierra Leone are particularly appropriate since it was here that Sir John's great uncle, George Zochonis, began what is now PZ Cussons in 1884.





The Zochonis Charitable Trust – Exceptional Donations

All donations made to charities by ZCT have the clear objective of either enhancing the quality of life for those who are disadvantaged or providing opportunities for people. In both cases lives are changed and hopefully improved.

Whilst this is the normal activity of the Trust, there are occasions when a charity identifies a need for a particular facility, piece of equipment or a building which would transform the lives of the people it serves. However, the difficulty they face is how to fund their ambitious project. In such circumstances ZCT, having thoroughly researched the proposal, then makes an Exceptional Donation which will either cover the entire cost of the project or contribute so significantly that the charity may be more confident of raising the additional necessary funds.

One of the key criteria for the Trustees in granting such a donation is that it produces a seismic change to the charity's beneficiaries within a period of three years.







The Zochonis Charitable Trust's donations have included a significant sum towards a pilot project which is providing permanent residential accommodation to young people with life-limiting conditions whose parents are unable to care for them. Two adapted semi-detached properties converted into one house provide excellent facilities in a homely environment.

Donations have also contributed to the funding of a nurse on the care team, the equipping of a new bedroom including a hoist, to enable the teenagers and young adults greater independence, and a beach hut providing a place of relaxation in the grounds of Francis Lodge within the hospice.

The support of the Trust has been vital in continually helping us to expand and develop our services now and into the future.
